I do not know that dealers in the necessaries of life are violating this law, but the Kentucky senate adopted a resolution calling upon the attorney general and commonwealth's and county attorneys to make an investigation along this line. I have had complaints from different parts of the state that certain dealers are violating the law.

"At a time like this the temptation increase prices above what is reato increase prices above what is a complete is great. It is the patrictic duty of every officer to prevent any imposition on the public. The anti-trust law is amply sufficient to punish. any person or corporation who may onter into any agreement to fix prices, and if prices are fixed by the concert-ed action of two or more persons or concerns the law has been violated.






