16 Inch Snow Falls On Surprised East

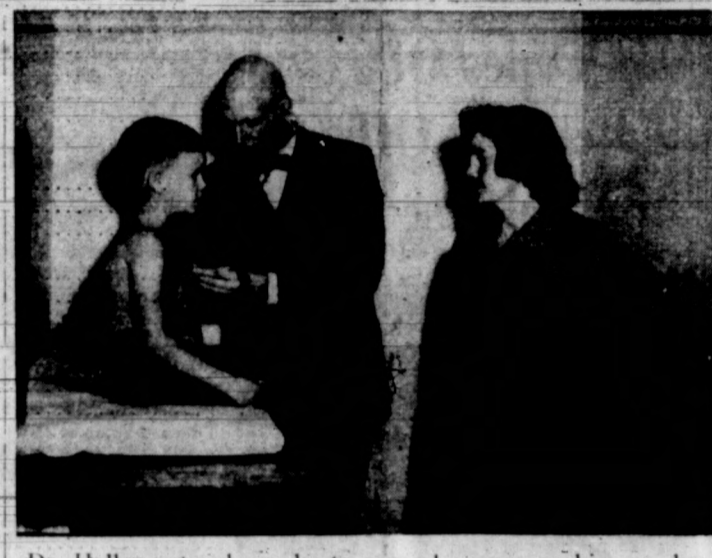

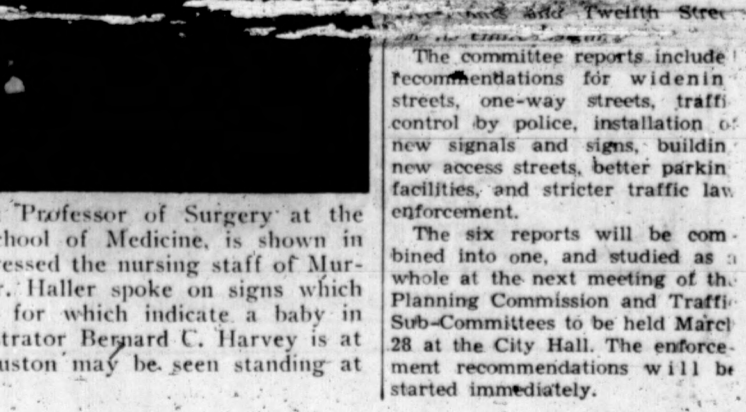
Book Exhibit Will Be At High School Through Next Week

NEW YORK (UPI) — Everyone in the out-of-show business seems to be worrying about the cost of the motion picture "Cleopatra" except Walter Wanger, who is merely the producer.

"This is not just another movie costing between \$20 million and \$25 million."

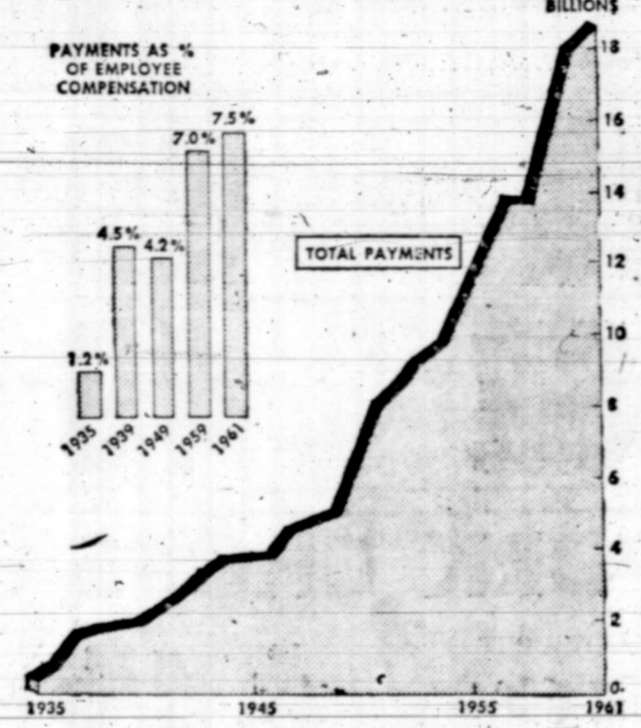
Wanger, the distinguished looking veteran of stage and films on a brief hop back here between takes in Italy. "This is a definitive picture of the famous Egyptian queen and two Caesars of the Roman empire."

"It is the type of film that should be as good 40 to 50 years from now as the day it is first released. It can be re-released every few years to net a few more millions of dollars in the manner that, say, "Gone With The Wind," periodically makes the circuit."

Wanger, who has employed many beautiful and talented actresses in his 40 years as a top executive in the industry, was ecstatic about Elizabeth Taylor, who playing Cleopatra.

"She has never looked lovelier," he said, "nor had a better opportunity to display her acting talent. I note that she was No. 1 in the poll of exhibitors as to the star who sold the most tickets in 1961. That is only the beginning."

"You must remember that Cleopatra was not just a sex symbol, a seductress who loved two Caesars. She was an astute, educated stateswoman with a thorough knowledge of the sciences and arts of her time. Our conception of her in this film calls for an actress, and Miss Taylor is all of that."

Long In Works

Wanger pointed out that the "Cleopatra" project, which he is bringing to life through the sponsorship of 20th Century-Fox, is one he has been working on for some five years, always with Miss Taylor in mind.

"I would never have done it without her late husband, producer Mike Todd, who, I am sure, would have had her to do it had he lived. The question rises as to why it is necessary, with Miss Taylor being such a sure money-maker, to burden the budget with the goldplated salaries of such stars as Rex Harrison and Richard Burton, who play Julius Caesar and Marc Antony, respectively. You could produce a profitable film, even these expensive days, for the salaries they draw. Wouldn't just good, solid actors suffice?"

"We use players of their calibre for the same reason that we hired Miss Taylor," the producer said. "In short, because this is no ordinary movie. An theirs are no ordinary roles, not simply supporting parts."

"Having players of their stature is one of the reasons that this film will be in circulation many years from now. It is true that they and several other fine and expensive actors loom large in the budget, but you'll see that they are worth whatever they are paid."

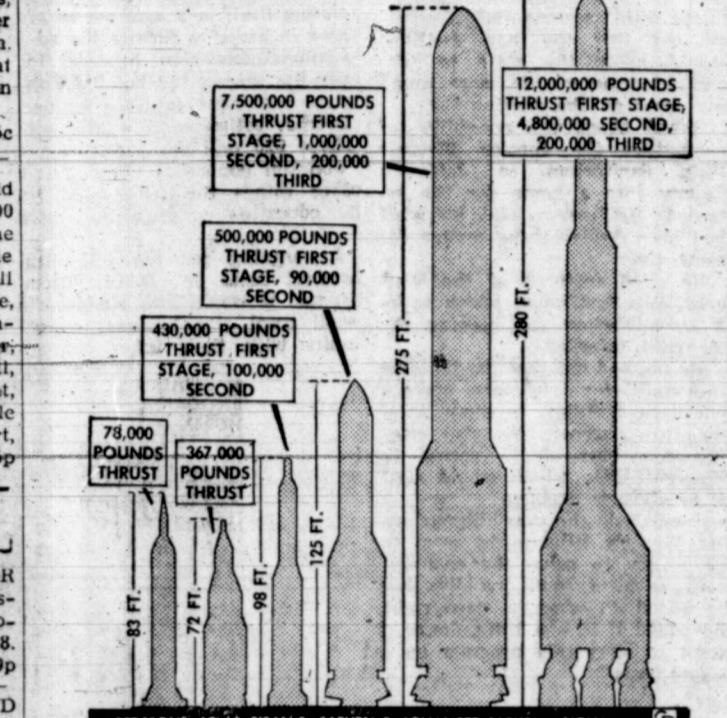
Nike-Zeus Anti-Missile Missile Works

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Immediate Start To Be Made On Renovating Retarded Home

FRANKFORT, Ky. (UP) — An immediate start will be made on renovation of the Kentucky Training Home and construction of new facilities at the home for the mentally retarded, Gov. Bert T. Combs said today.

The governor outlined the allocation of the expanded appropriations for the new mental retardation program and noted that building improvements will allow the state to care for 550 to 700 patients.

The allocation of mental retardation funds as outlined by Combs included the following items:

—Complete renovation of the 102-year-old training home at a cost of \$300,000 to \$500,000.

—Construction of a new ward building at the home to house

an additional 200 patients to cost about \$750,000.

—A 40 per cent increase in the operating budget of the training home to provide training and rehabilitation that impossible within the present budget limit.

—And \$478,000 for a program of field service, foster home care and development of local facilities during the next biennium.

Combs said he was acting on the recommendations of State Mental Health Commissioner Dr. H. L. McPheeters in establishing the policy in the mental retardation field.

McPheeters is head of the department into which the mental retardation division is being transferred by the state reorganization bill which is expected to pass the

the so-called truck deal. However, when it finally did get around to the orders of the day, the Senate proceeded with more dispatch than it has so far this session.

Altogether it passed 15 bills, the most important of which were two measures dealing with educational television.

The two bills, which ran into trouble last week when they were first called up for a vote, drew only a minimum of opposition. Already approved by the House, the measures now go to Gov. Bert T. Combs for his signature.

The principal opposition came from Sens. George Overbay, D-Murray; Casper Cap Gardner, Owensboro; and H. Dick Johnson, R-Marion.

Gardner objected to the state's placing itself in a long period of debt in order to finance the educational television. In order to get the money for the TV, the state will have to issue bonds. Overbay estimated it would cost about \$20 million.

Johnson contended there were other things the state needs in its education program far more than television.

In arguing for the bill, Sen. Lambert Hehl Jr., D-Fort Thomas, said it would give students in small rural schools equal opportunity with their urban counterparts.

He pointed out that the building is a multi-story structure, while a one-story building is more ideal for this purpose. He also cited the numerous single rooms in Waverly Hills which would pose a custodial problem.

Combs said the possibility of using Waverly Hills might seem to be a way to solve the custodial care problem more rapidly, but he added, "I want to state right he added if it is a little slower, I want to start this program on a sound basis."

General Assembly and become law next July.

"I must have talked with 50 experts on this subject and at least 500 people who think they are experts," Combs said. "I have come to the conclusion we've got the best expert advice right here in state government. I'm going to take Dr. McPheeters' advice on this program."

Combs added, however, that he had imposed his opinion over McPheeters' judgment on one matter — the balance in the use of funds for new facilities and for the operation of the program.

"McPheeters is concerned with training and therapy for these children," Combs said, "but he has overlooked the need for the construction of the new ward building to relieve some of this immediate problem of custodial care."

The governor stated that there are at least 9,000 children all over Kentucky who need to be admitted to the training home and he pointed out that the new facilities would allow the state to take care of some of the more pressing cases on the waiting list.

Asked about the possibility of converting the former Waverly Hills Sanatorium in Jefferson County into a home for the retarded, McPheeters said his staff had been studying the matter for some time.

He cited features of the Waverly Hills institution which make it unsatisfactory for housing the mentally retarded.
