ITALIANS ARE "THERE." WASHINGTON, April 19—An Italian regiment already is in France and for mright wing of Allied armies, the Italian embassy announces.

(By Associated Press.) LONDON, April 19.—Six German divisions, engaged in the attack on Givenchy-St. Venant sector, attacked northern part of Lys yesterday and this morning. Battle area on South Kemmel also repulsed onslaughts. The statement says there is no change in the situation on the entire British front during the night, which was comparativley quiet except for artillery activity.

The British are standing firm before strong enemy attacks on the front north of Arras, while southeast of Amiens the French drove the Germans back in the region of Castel. The heaviest fighting is occurring on the northern front, on the southern side of the salient from Stvernant, west of Merville to Givenchy. The Germans are using ten divisions of about 137 men each. This eleven-mile front capture of most of the Messines-Wytschaete ridge by the Germans does not seriously weaken the British positions, as Haig outwitted the enemy by withdrawing his lines northeast of Ypres in this region.
