## Vinegar Is Loyal Friend To The Cook

You have a loyal friend and a "miracle worker" in a common household product usually taken for granted—vinegar. Magical vinegar, so indispensable in cooking and around the home in cleaning, removing stains, laundry, and even personal grooming, according to Mrs. Lorene Freeman, home economist, Speas Company, makers of fine vinegars for over 75 years.

Here are a few tips that can put vinegar to work for you:

Add 1 1/2 cups vinegar to half tub of rinse water to make white clothes whiter.

A small amount of vinegar added to rinse water will help prolong the life of laundry and lingerie.

Two cups of vinegar added to rinse water eliminates soap residue and odor from blankets, and leaves them with a nap as soft as new.

You can renew the luster of cloudy-looking woodwork or furniture by rubbing them with a soft lint-free cloth wrung from a solution of a tablespoon of vinegar in a quart of warm water. Finish by wiping the surface with a soft, dry cloth. Follow the grain of the wood.

To clean your electric iron, remove dark or burnt spots by rubbing them with vinegar and salt heated in an aluminum pan. Then polish as you would silver.

If lap water has clogged your steam iron, fill it with a mixture of vinegar and one cup of water. Let stand overnight. The next day, heat iron, and remove the mixture. Rinse with clear water. Sedimentation will rinse out, and the iron will work like new.

To remove tarnish and clean brass or copper, wash the surface with vinegar in which as much salt as possible has been dissolved. You can make this into a paste by adding flour. Rinse with clear water.

If sour cream or milk is needed in a hurry, add one tablespoon of vinegar to each cupful of sweet milk or cream.

Tough meat can be tenderized by placing it in a marinade of vinegar slightly diluted with water.

When washing vegetables, such as greens, lettuce, etc., add vinegar to the water and let the vegetables remain for a few minutes. All insects will come to the surface. To make your nail polish last longer, add two tablespoons of vinegar to a half-cup of warm water. Dip fingernails in the solution for a few seconds before applying polish.

Home Style Kosher Dill Pickles  
To each quart jar, add:  
1 head fresh dill  
2 or 3 cloves garlic  
1 small red or green hot pepper (optional)

Select fresh, firm cucumbers, wash and pick in jars, bring to a boil:  
2 qts. water  
1 1/2 cups SPEAS Distilled or Cider Vinegar  
1 cup non-iodized salt

Pour hot solution over cucumbers and seal. Pickles will be ready in 3 to 4 weeks, depending on size of cucumbers. For plain, dill pickles, omit the garlic buds.

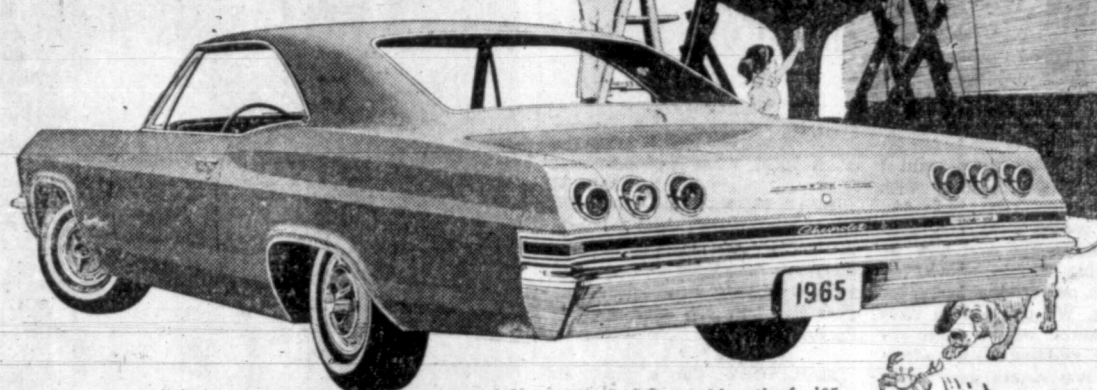

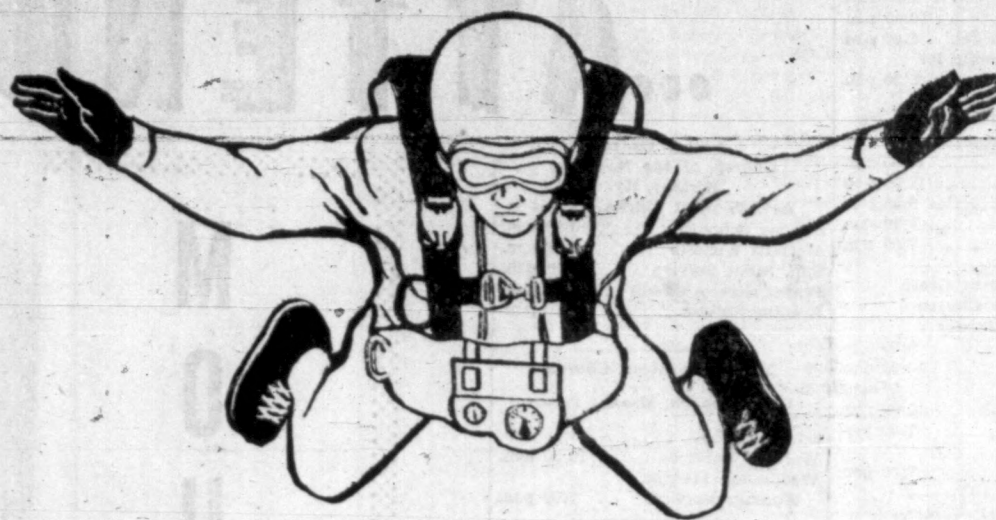

and a junior or senior in high school.

A typical day for a DE student consists of one or two hours studying related business subjects in addition to the required subjects for graduation. The DE student spends an average of 15 hours a week in practical training and experience through actual employment in a business establishment. The job is actually an extension of the "in-class" program, for which the stu-

dent receives the going rate of pay plus school credit.

A Lay Advisory Committee will be appointed from local business firms. The purpose of the committee will be to render assistance in establishing training status, standards with advice on practical and functional current trends in distribution.

It is now anticipated that 26,000,000 young people will be entering the labor market during this decade. This is four times the number that entered in the past decade. For this reason it is essential that businessmen, parents and schools cooperate with one another

in furthering the educational facilities for our children.

William Thomas Jeffrey will be the coordinator-instructor for the DE program. Jeffrey has been employed by the Murray city schools for the past two years, before that he achieved varied business experience in real estate and banking.
