### MRS. SAM PAUL DIED AT PRYORSBURG

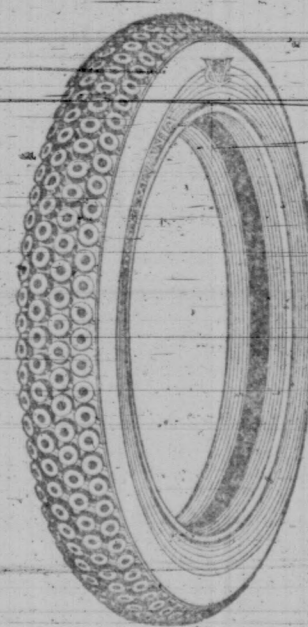

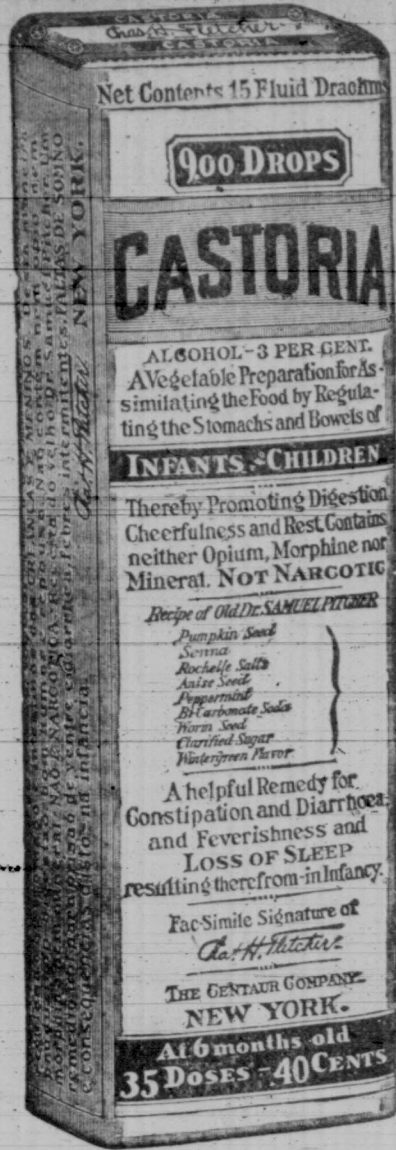

HARLAN, KY., April 16—With the charges against him dismissed and a statement signed on the minutes of the court by the commonwealth's attorney to the effect that there was no evidence against him warranting further prosecution, Dr. Harry C. Winnes, formerly a member of the state veterinarian staff, once tried for the murder of Miss Laura Parsons, Pine Mountain settlement school teacher, tonight left for Cincinnati. Whether or not he will apply for the position he resigned when charges were first made against him, Dr. Winnes would not say today.

**FORDSON OPERATING  
COST CHEAPER THAN  
HORSES, SAYS FORD**

Comparative Figures Given to Show That Tractor Does Better Work at Less Cost

**BIG HELP IN A RUSH**  
Plows and Discs Ground Twice as Fast as Horses and Never Gets Tired—Farmers Lose Large Sums by Experimenting

An article published in a recent issue of the Bureau County Republican relative to the comparative cost of motor power farming and with horses makes the statement that horse power has been proven the cheaper by actual tests on 286 farms in Ohio, Indiana and Illinois.  
This statement does not give the make of the 286 tractors used on these farms, and to get a fair comparison and we believe that this test should be made with each make of tractor individually.  
The farmers of this county have lost millions of dollars experimenting with different makes of tractors and the manufacturers of these experiments were perfectly willing to let them pay for it. This also applies to the motor car industry.  
Henry Ford spent millions of dollars perfecting his tractor before he placed it on the market. Mr. Ford paid for the experimenting. He placed in the hands of the American farmer a 100 per cent tractor at a price that neither horses or manufacturers of any other tractor has been able to compete with.  
There are today approximately 175,000 Fordson tractors in use and they are fast obliterating the "black eye" given motor power farming by the big unyielding tractor that has always been a detriment to the farmer.

**Some Comparative Figures.**  
Below are some figures showing the comparative cost of farming with horses and a Fordson tractor. In plowing, five (5) horses on a two-bottom plow have been compared with a Fordson tractor and a two-bottom plow.

In making up this table the figures on the horse drawn machinery were taken from a survey on sixty farms in Story county by the Iowa State College, Ames.

The figures on the Fordson were taken from the results of work on one of the farms of Professor Kosselbach and checked by Professor Sjogren of the University of Nebraska.

We did not take into consideration depreciation on the tractor or horse-drawn implements as it would be practically the same on either set.

The cost in dollars and cents is very largely in favor of the tractor, but that it is not the great reason why a tractor is a good investment. The time saved when the ground is right for seeding is the vital point. The value of land has come to a price where it is necessary to do better farm work in order to get returns for the money invested. With a tractor it is possible to do about twice the work in the rush season as compared to the horse. When the rush comes and horses are soft and you cannot work a full day, while a tractor is in as good condition at 3 p. m. as it is at six a. m. and does not need a whole hour at noon.

**Quality of Work Done.**

As to quality of work it is possible to do better work with tractor-drawn implements than is generally done with the horse-drawn machinery as the tractor travels at a greater speed than horse, consequently when plowing or discing you get a better pulverizing effect on the ground than you would get at a slower speed.

For your information, the average speed of horse-drawn implements is approximately two miles per hour and the speed of the Fordson tractor, running the engine at the normal rate of one thousand revolutions, travels at the rate of 3.1 miles per hour in plowing on middle gear. A tractor pulling two 14-inch plows at this speed in the ground, would be possible to plow 3.1 acres in ten hours but there is always time lost in turning the corners and the slipping of the drive wheels reduces it to 3 acres in ten hours.

We arrived at cost of horse labor of \$2.15 an hour from taking an average of one hundred sixty-seven horses on twenty-eight farms of which the owners kept an accurate record. These horses worked on an average of one thousand hours a year and the cost was made up from the following items:
