What with the coal strike of 600,000 idle men, besides the two or three millions already unemployed—we want somebody to show us where the "Normalcy" comes in.

The marshall complexion, now being so popularly worn by some of the ladies, is a puzzle to the rest of us—we mean as to where the beauty part is. It is a dead-white, pasty effect around the nose, mouth and eyes, with a large tanned streak on the forehead and neck, and—but pshaw! we can't describe it—you know.

The removal of office of the entire force of the federal department of engraving last Friday at the close of the day, is a record-breaking example of summary and unexplained dismissal of civil service employees—and incidentally it shows how very, very hungry for pie the Republicans are. The whole thing reminds us of a bank raid by midnight bandits.

No matter how small or unpretentious, nor how far removed from the most popular streets, a roof and yard-plot, perhaps a garden plot also, of his own, makes the head of the house, man or woman, an independent king in his castle—and thereby contributes more happiness than any other one thing.

This is a day for better homes. Advancement in education, religion, closer association of the masses, all call for better homes—individually owned homes, if you please. For homes will never be much better until men own their own homes.

Cities everywhere are carrying on campaigns for home-owning. We have learned that planting homes is stabilizing society. Goodness knows, it needs to be stabilized. It lessens vice and crime, it sets up new ramparts of defense for the Republic and civilization.

A wandering, house-to-house community season after season,

with no property-tax to pay, is a shiftless one—an unhappy one—and to the better element, an expensive one. So it behooves the well-to-do to encourage home-owning, from a purely mercenary viewpoint, if from no other.

There ought to be in every well-ordered city and county, companies organized for the very purpose of helping the poor to own their own homes. Such concerns could make a legitimate profit for themselves, and still be friends and helpers to the men and women of small means, and smaller business ability. This idea is not far-fetched—nor visionary. It is good business.

A great class of people who work and make good earnings, and who are the very salt of the earth, in moral, upright citizenship, and in the support of the community in which they live, never accumulate anything, nor own their own homes, because they lack business experience of trade.

They are not traders—they are workers—and this community, nor any other, can survive and prosper without them.

The professional trader and business man could well afford to show these the way to buy and pay for a home. It is a fact, that the toiler never lives by his wits—and therefore, the thinker, the professional business man is under charge to God and to society, to have the toiler's interest on his own heart—AND TO SHOW HIM THE WAY.

WAREHOUSING AND CO-OPERATIVE MARKETING.

The federal warehousing of all kinds of farm products is proving both effectual and popular. The west has entered in whole heartedly, and the South is coming. Since the federal act, not long since, the department has licensed 3000 cotton warehouses, with a capacity for 1,500,000 bales, 278 grain warehouses, eighteen for wool, and a few for tobacco.

COURT TO PROBE TABOR BILL

Frankfort, Ky., April 5.—Grand jury investigation into the facts connected with the Scrip bill introduced by Senator Bannie Tabor which failed to be enrolled the last day of the General Assembly, will be made next Saturday. Subpoenas were issued today for the appearance on that date of Gates Young, Clerk of the Senate, Charles J. Howes, Clerk of the House; Senator Tabor, Emmerson Beauchamp, assistant Senate clerk; Miss Jennie McDonald, enrolling clerk of the Senate, and Miss Virginia Thomas, stenographer to Speaker James H. Thompson of the House.
No communication has been received from Senator Tabor by Commonwealth's Attorney Victor A. Bradley, but Mr. Bradley admitted this afternoon that the subpoenas were issued and he said: "In view of so much publicity, I thought the matter should be looked into and I have subpoenaed the officers who ought to be able to throw the most light on it."
Thomas Hatcher of Pipeville and John M. Thoobold of Ashland, the latter a lobbyist for the fire brick industries of Eastern Kentucky, also were summoned. They are said to have worked against the bill.
The bill, which would have compelled corporations issuing scrip to advance on wages to their employees to redeem it at its face value, was lost in the confusion of the last night of the session of the General Assembly, and although it had passed both the Senate and House it was never





Bryan Lacks Special Training, Scientist Says

New York, April 4.—Asked his opinion concerning Mr. William J. Bryan's reference to mud and monkeys in his lecture on Darwinism, Edwin C. Conklin, professor of biology at Princeton, yesterday said the whole discourse was mere buffoonery. The professor went on to say:

"Mr. Bryan may as well discuss the cause and cure of infantile paralysis. He lacks special training on the subject. As Huxley once said, 'get a little first hand knowledge of biology.' That is all that is necessary."

"There is a widely prevalent view, especially in politics, that one man's opinion is as good as another's on any subject whatever. Mr. Bryan has the same idea. He thinks that he can carry it into science, irrespective of whether he has taken pains to study it or not."

DEPORT ALIENS FOR VIOLATIONS OF LIQUOR LAWS

Washington, April 5.—By a vote of more than three to one, the house late today passed and sent to the Senate a bill authorizing the deportation of aliens convicted in state or federal courts on charges of having violated the narcotic and volstead acts.

Described by prohibition advocates as a step toward better law enforcement, and characterized by Representative Graham, Penn., ranking Republican on the judiciary committee as a "monstrous piece of legislation," the bill as presented by the immigration committee, stood up against all attacks.

A motion to recommit so that the provision relating to conviction in state courts might be eliminated was defeated and the measure was put through as framed, 222 to 73.

Representative Walsh, Republican, Massachusetts, a member of the judiciary committee, which wrote the original Volstead act, and who offered the motion to recommit, declared he believed now as then, that the enforcement law was made too drastic at the start.

FATTY ARBUCKLE DENIES STRUGGLE WITH RAPPE GIRL

San Francisco, April 5.—Koscoe C. (Fatty) Arbuckle took the stand in his own defense at 10:45 a. m. today in the third trial of a manslaughter charge against him resulting from the death of Miss Virginia Rappe.

Arbuckle followed Dr. George Franklin Shiels, defense medical expert and one of the defense alienists in the first trial of Harry K. Thaw for the alleged murder of Stanford White.

Arbuckle smiled as he took the stand. He said he knew Miss Rappe for five years. He acknowledged being present at the party in the St. Francis Hotel the night which he is alleged to have fatally injured Miss Rappe. He said he had invited a few of the guests.

Gin, whisky and orange juice were served at the party, he said. "Breakfast" was served at 2 p. m., while most of the guests were there. He left the room in which the guests were at 3 p. m. and went into his own room to dress for an engagement with Mrs. May Taulbe, a friend, he said.

"I went into my bedroom and locked the door," he said. "I went to the bathroom and the door struck something. I looked in and saw Miss Rappe on the floor. She was holding her stomach and moaning."

New York, April 5.—John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, established temporary strike headquarters here today, to await the outcome of the House labor committee's invitation to bituminous coal operators to join the miners in a wage conference at Washington, D. C.

While awaiting further advice from Congressman Nolan, chairman of the House committee, Mr. Lewis announced he would attempt to hasten negotiations for settlement of the anthracite strike through the representatives of operators and miners in session here.

Referring to reports from Wash-

ington that operators of Ohio and Indiana already had sent telegrams to Mr. Nolan declining to meet with the miners, Mr. Lewis said:

"I have not received any official notification that the operators refused the invitation. I can only reaffirm our willingness to negotiate with them at any time."
Mr. Lewis appeared well pleased with the attitude taken by the congressmen toward his presentation of the miners' case, and expressed a belief that the workers had established their sincerity of purpose at the hearings in Washington.

"Our position remains unassailable," he said. "There also seems to be a simultaneous response on the part of the republic to our efforts to settle peaceably our controversy with the operators."
