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PROFITEERS HIT AS BCNUS FOES

Washington, April 22.—First effort of the Senate Finance Committee to get down to the actual task of writing a soldier bonus bill will be made tomorrow. Senator McCumber, the committee chairman, will have a meeting of Republican members to go over the various plans suggested and attempt to reach an agreement on the form of bill to be presented. The Republicans intend to give careful study to all the methods proposed before conferring with the President on the final plan of

legislation. War profiteers are threatening Congress with "a gold-plated pistol" in an effort to prevent passage of soldier bonus legislation. Hanford MacNider, national commander of the American Legion, declared in a statement issued here tonight.

Funds Promised. Charge. "My attention," he said, "has just been drawn to the published threat of the financial interests of Republican persuasion that if the Republican Congress passes the veterans' adjusted compensation bill there will be no contributions from that quarter to Republican

campaign funds. In the words of one dispatch big business has informed Chairman Adams that if Congress passes the bonus bill it may get some soldiers' votes for the respective candidates but it will lose the support of business.

The American Legion has made a clean fight, based on the merit, the justice, equity and economic soundness of this legislation, and not one scintilla of evidence has been produced to dispute these contentions.

But now a real effort to coerce Congress reveals itself, and the effort is being made by the entrenched financial interests and not by the American Legion.

The lines are more clearly drawn than ever. On one hand we have an element of the business and financial interests of the nation which contributed least and profited most by the war. These interests are threatening Congress, flourishing a pistol and a gold-plated one at that.

On the other hand we have the men who fought for their country presenting their case on its merits confident that they enjoy the nation's confidence now as they did in 1917 and that justice will be done.

Whom do the people of the United States wish their representatives in Congress to follow? It is for them to choose."

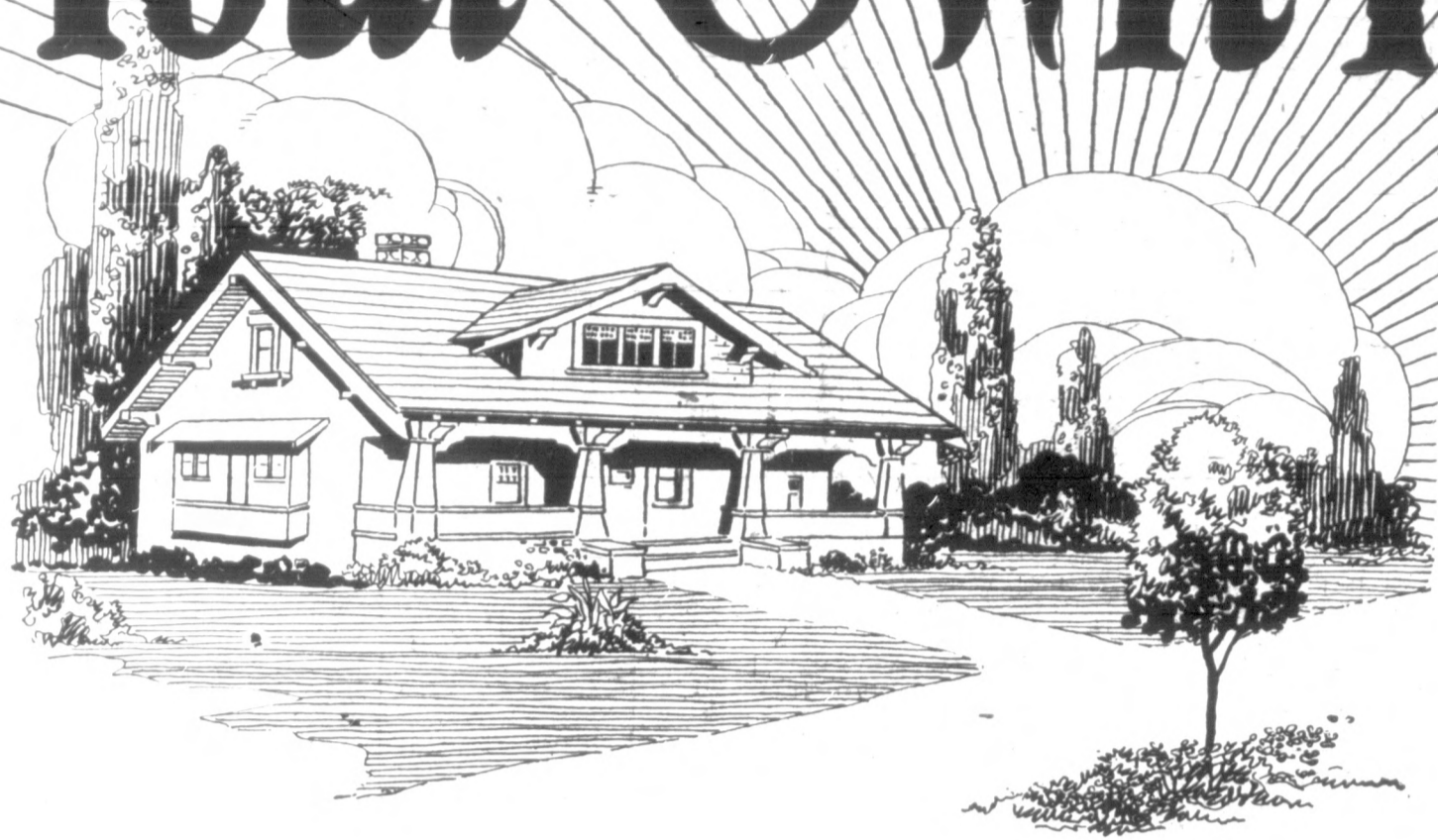

STATE'S MINERS GET NEW SCALE

Springfield, Ill., April 25.—Negotiations of separate state wage agreements by striking coal miners in Kentucky and Tennessee was announced today by Frank Farrington, Illinois president of the United Mine Workers.

Separate wage agreements with locals in Illinois are imminent, he added.

In Alabama, he said, the state union officers have instructed the members to continue at work.

U. S. to Act in Strike.

Washington, April 25.—The government is working on a plan looking to ending the coal strike which it will submit soon to both operators and union leaders, it was said today at the White House. Details of the plan were not disclosed, but it was said that it does not include federal supervision of the coal industry.

The plan, which now is receiving the attention of President Harding and his advisers was said to contemplate a permanent solution, if possible, of the basic problems of the industry. Presentation of the plan, it was indicated, would be made when a favorable opportunity presents itself.

No Union Break.

Indianapolis, April 25.—Coal fields of Alabama, Kentucky and Tennessee are only partly unionized and any settlement in these districts between operators and the miners was not regarded at

headquarters of the United Mine Workers as making a break among the union forces participating in the nation wide suspension of work.

Miners Hire More Men.

Owensboro, Ky., April 25.—According to Vice-President Webb Ames, of District 23, 10,000 union miners are at work.

Since April, when the nation wide strike was called, about 3,000 miners have been added to the mines in Hopkins, Muhlenberg and Ohio. Idle for months are resuming operations in this district on account of orders that are being received.

The union miners were not called out in district 23 on account of the contract with the operators not expiring until April 1, 1923.

ANDERSON FREE IN 5 MINUTES IN I. C. WRECK CASE

Paducah Ky., April 25.—Less than five minutes were required by the jury to agree on a verdict of acquittal yesterday afternoon in the trial of Ira Anderson on an indictment charging him with an attempt to wreck a train.

The jury received the case shortly before 6 o'clock and on retiring read the instructions and on the first ballot voted for acquittal.

Before the court officials had an opportunity to relax from the strain of the trial that continued throughout two days, the verdict was returned.

Anderson thanked the members of the jury, while his wife cried for joy as she shook hands with each juror.

Alibi is Unshaken.

The strong alibi established by Anderson was not shaken by the witnesses for the prosecution, as they were uncertain as to dates they saw Anderson in Paducah immediately preceding the derailment of the Illinois Central passenger train No. 103 at Epperson May 23, 1921.

Anderson took the stand yesterday morning shortly after 10 o'clock and denied every accusation made against him by Howard Penix in his confession. He testified that from May 9, 1921, until Aug. 1, 1921, he was in the employ of George E. Day's Sons, a firm engaged in painting and paperhanging, in Springfield, Ill., on those dates.

George E. Day, a member of the firm, produced the time records of the firm to establish Anderson's story that he was at work at the home of William R. Shafer at Fancy Prairie, eight teen miles from Springfield, May 22 and May 23, the date the train

was derailed.

Anderson was corroborated by Shafer, who was present in court. Day and Shafer were the main witnesses for the defense, and the prosecution failed to weaken the effect of their statements.

METEOR OBSERVED

Los Angeles, April 24.—A meteor of unusual size and brilliancy darted across the sky west of Los Angeles last night.

Observers at the Mount Wilson observatory about 29 miles north of here said the meteor was 15 or 20 times as brilliant as the planet Venus. From their perch high up on the mountainside they saw the meteor break at an apparently short distance from the earth.

The meteor was of startling appearance. The body was followed by a flaming tail of blue and green shades which spread out like a fan.

Escaped Felon Found at Frankfort

Frankfort, Ky., April 25.—John L. Dale, negro convict, sent up from Lawrence county for five years for storehouse breaking, who has been missing since Friday morning, was found hiding under the floor of the prison shoe shop inside the compound early today. He had had nothing to eat for

more than four days and was weak when a guard discovered him that he was unable to walk.

BABY KILLS 2-Year-Old.

Calo, Ill., April 24.—Loren Jeanetta Reichert, 3-year-old, of Grand Chain, was shot and killed Saturday by a three-year-old boy, relatives here were informed today. A young man, carrying a loaded revolver in his coat, lay the coat on the ground, and the three-year-old lad took the weapon and pulled the trigger. The girl was shot in the head and died instantly.

Rural Carrier Examination.
The United States Civil Service
Commission has announced an ex-
amination to be held at Mayfield,
Ky., on May 27, 1922, to fill the
position of rural carrier at Wingo,
Ky., and vacancies that may later
occur on rural routes from that
post office. The salary of a
rural carrier on a standard daily
wagon route of 24 miles is \$1,800
per annum, with an additional \$30
per mile per annum for each mile
or major fraction thereof in ex-
cess of 24 miles.
The salary on motor routes
ranges from \$2,450 to \$2,600 per
annum, according to length. Sep-
arate examinations for motor
routes and wagon routes are no
longer held. Appointments to
both positions will be made from
the same register. The examina-
tion will be open only to citizens
who are actually domiciled in the
territory of the post office where
the vacancy exists and who meet
the other requirements set forth
in Form 1977. Both men and
women, if qualified, may enter
this examination, but appointing
officers have the legal right to
specify the sex desired in re-
questing certification of eligibles.
Women will not be considered for
rural carrier appointment unless
they are the widows of U. S.
soldiers, sailors or marines, or the
wives of U. S. soldiers, sailors or
marines who are physically dis-
qualified for examination by reas-
on of injuries received in the
line of military duty. Form 1977
and application blanks may be obtain-
ed from the offices mentioned
above or from the United States
Civil Service Commission at Wash-
ington, D. C. Applications
should be forwarded to the Com-
mission at Washington, D. C., at
the earliest practicable date.
