### PARIS WINS FROM MAYFIELD

Paris, Tenn., Aug. 1.—Paris registered three times in the first and defeated Mayfield today, score 3 to 2. With the bases full in the first, Jacobs let a fast one get through him behind the bat, and one scored, followed by two other runners when Linton threw wild to first to catch a batter.

Linton's hit in the second scored Chisel for Mayfield's first count, while Schneider's double in the fifth scored Burkle, who got on with a single. The game was fast and featureless.

### LONG HAS SLIGHT LEAD OVER REED

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 2.—At 1 o'clock this morning 1,636 precincts out of 3,848 in the state gave Reed 91,708, Long 99,052. More than 800 precincts of the Reed stronghold, St. Louis and Kansas City, remains to be heard from, while more than 1,400 county precincts, claimed by Long, are still out.

It is believed that it might take the complete returns to decide the race.

Mr. Long, from his headquarters, at this hour claimed he would win by 20,000 to 30,000.

Reed led his opponent in the first 92 Jackson County (including Kansas City) precincts by about 90 votes to the precincts reporting gave him an average lead of 245 votes each.

The Commission recently made a tour of the nine cities which are seeking the western school. After their return from the present trip the Commissioners will meet to decide the sites of the schools.

### Road Building Boom in Canada

Reports to Highways Information Service, New York, from the various Canadian provinces for June 1922 show contracts for new roads and streets let during that month to the value of \$3,774,200. The total number of contracts let was 72. New projects reported under consideration numbered 146 and were to cost \$4,687,800. The value of the new construction contracted for during June in each province was as follows: Ontario, \$1,664,000; Quebec, \$822,000; New Brunswick, \$151,900; Nova Scotia, \$115,000; British Columbia, \$385,300; Alberta, \$16,500; Saskatchewan, \$28,000; Manitoba, \$47,400.

### Woodrow Wilson May Retire to Large Estate is the Latest Gossip

Washington, July 31.—The latest bit of gossip that is circulating in Washington society is that Woodrow Wilson has bought a tract of land beyond "Friendship," the country home of Edward B. McLean, and there will maintain an estate. It is an open question that the former president is the recipient of a very large income not only from royalties on his books and other writings, but from the law practice he is nominally conducting here, although the practical work of the firm is undertaken by Bainbridge Colby, former secretary of state's partner.

**Planting Trees Along the Highways**  
To make Minnesota famous as "the state with the tree-lined highways" is the object which the forestry department of that state has set out to accomplish. The

department will plant 30,000 trees along the highways this year and each year hereafter will add to the number. What Minnesota is doing is also being done in Pennsylvania and many other states. Experts declare that if the trees are set back far enough their roots will not injure road pavements. It was contended at one time that tree roots and the shade cast by the branches were detrimental, for instance to asphalt paving, but experience in Washington D. Middlesboro, Ky., July 31.—National guard troops on strike duty were maintaining machine gun positions in the hills near the Yellow Creek Coal Company's operations at Bosworth, Bell County, today following a bloodless skirmish with alleged miners and their sympathizers Sunday night. Several hundred shots were said to have been fired during the skirmish which followed an attack in which rocks and firearms were used against the guardsmen.

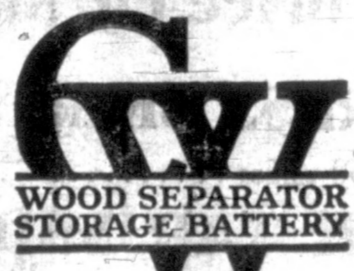

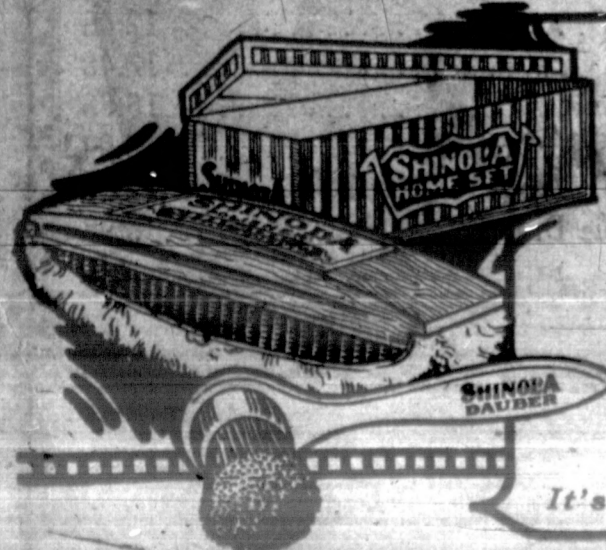
