SUGAR INQUIRY REPORT TODAY

Washington, April 18.—The Department of Justice investigation of the sugar price advance inaugurated several weeks ago, reached the point today where officials were able to promise a statement of results within twenty-four hours.

Acting Attorney General Seymour, after presenting a report on the inquiry to President Harding, the second within two days, announced that it had been decided to show at least a part of the government's hand tomorrow. He refused to give any advance information as to the course of the investigation, which has been conducted largely through United States District Attorney Hayward in New York, the controlling sugar market of the country.

Ordered to "Seize and Bring Into Court" Whale Weighing Over 75 Tons

Biloxi, Miss., April 18.—The United States marshal here said today he thought it "improbable" that he would attempt to "seize and bring into court," as ordered by a writ of replevin, a dead whale estimated to weigh more than 75 tons, now at anchor off Deer Island, and the subject of a row as to its ownership. Several thousand dollars to be paid for carcass and the receipts paid by the hundreds of the curious who have "shelled out" for the privilege of seeing it is the real stake involved.

The hearing on the writ of replevin has been set for the June term of court, but by that time the whale will have been gone the way of all flesh. It is to be sold, however, it is said today, and the court will hold the purchase money and all money collected from the sightseers up to the time of the sale.

Hopkinsville, Ky., April 18.—A complete account today of the advances made to members of the Dark Tobacco Growers' Cooperative Association showed that a total of \$7,848,319 had been paid out. Of this amount approximately \$1,000,000 was sent into the One Shaker District, where a second advance will be made on May 15th. More than \$3,000,000 has been distributed to farmers in the Dark Fired Area. Figures for the exact disbursements in the Henderson Stemming and Green River Districts are not at hand.

Deliveries which reached the high mark for the season last week are steadily increasing. Report from Paducah yesterday stated that the record for McCracken county was broken Monday. The Mayfield houses are being operated at capacity, and the stations in Robertson county are crowded. Receipts on the Hopkinsville floors will be higher this week than they have ever been before. It is estimated now that practically all of the pooled tobacco in the "Black Patch" will be handled and graded by the middle of May, and that the second payment to members living in this section will be ready for distribution after July 1. That, of course, dependent upon the maintenance of the present delivery schedule. Bad weather for some other unforeseen occurrence might possibly extend the time considerably.

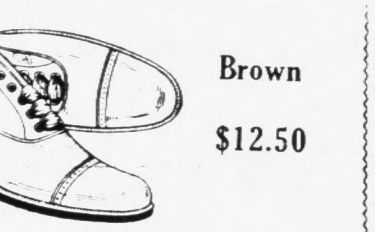

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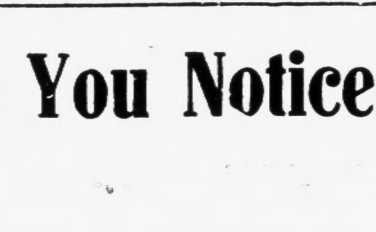

PROLONGED COLD DELAYS CROPS

Louisville, Ky., April 18.—A
summary of weather and crop
conditions in Kentucky for the
week ending April 17, issued late
today from the U. S. Weather
bureau here says:
"Unreasonably cool weather
with frequent frosts delayed the
growth of vegetation. Blue grass,
wheat and rye on well drained
land are doing fairly well; but
they have made little growth on
flat or low lands, because of the
water-soaked condition of the
soil. Pastures are ready for
grazing only on warm slopes.
"Fair progress was made with
plowing and planting potatoes dur-
ing the first three days, but the
work was stopped by heavy rains,
which prevented these activities
during the remainder of the
week. Some oats have been
sown and a beginning has been
made with early gardening, but
in general this work is greatly de-
layed because of cold, wet soil.
Wheat and rye continued to im-
prove and are generally in good
condition.
"Tobacco plants are coming up
in most beds not killed by the
frozes of March 31 and April 1.
The beds that were killed were
generally resown during the first
week in April and the plants are
not yet up. Plants will be plenti-
ful, but they are about two

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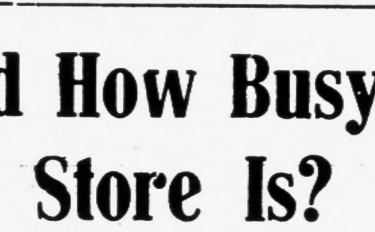

Wholesale Prices Rise.

Washington, April 18.—An in-
crease of one and one-quarter per
cent in wholesale prices in March
as compared with February, was
shown in figures on 404 commodi-
ties announced today by the bu-
reau of labor statistics of the de-
partment of labor.
Building materials and metals
again showed the greatest ad-
vance in prices, averaging 3 and
7 per cent, respectively. Small-
er increases were recorded for
the groups of farm products,
foods, cloths and clothing, chemi-
cals and drugs, house furnishings
and miscellaneous commodities.
In the food group, raw sugar av-
eraged 18.2 per cent higher and
granulated sugar 17.6 per cent
higher in March than in Febru-
ary.
Fuel and lighting with an av-
erage decline of 2.7 per cent,
showed the only decrease of all
the commodities, due to further
declines of bituminous coal
prices.
Compared with March a year
ago the general level of prices
showed an increase of 12 per
cent. Metals and metal pro-
ducts were 36.7 per cent higher,
building materials 27.7 per cent;
cloths and clothing 11.2.7 per
cent; farm products 10 per cent
and miscellaneous commodities
8.5 per cent.

Will Not Lower Bars For Aliens

Washington, April 18.—Although recognizing the existence of a labor shortage which, should it become serious might render advisable in excess of quota limits the admission of aliens, the State Department is not prepared to relax the requirements governing immigration.

President Harding, it was stated today at the White House, is keeping in touch with the situation, and admits that if the labor shortage becomes acute, it may become necessary to do something about it, but the gates will not be thrown open to meet the demands of employers at the expense of the best interest of the country.

This was the prompt response of the administration and of congressional leaders today to the demand of E. H. Gary, head of the United States Steel Corporation, for letting down the bars to relieve the labor shortage.

Secretary of Labor Davis, whose department is charged with the administration of the Immigration Act in a letter to President Harding, scored the policy advocated by Judge Gary and declared the need for still further restrictive measures including absolute exclusion of Japanese and other Asiatic immigration.

"With labor everywhere in demand," said Mr. Davis, after reviewing the industrial recovery, "it is inevitable that there should be agitation among some for the lifting of immigration restrictions. It is unnecessary to point out the evil of throwing open the gates at a time of prosperity in order to flood the country with workers and non-workers whose very presence would serve to bring prosperity to an end."

"It is a short-sighted policy to seek cheap labor through immigration. It has been my experience since the days when I worked in the mills that cheap labor is expensive labor, both for the industry which employs it and for the community which houses it."

Calling for an unambiguously defined policy with regard to Asiatic exclusion, Mr. Davis said: "I am clear that we should absolutely bar from our shores all races which are not naturalizable by the law of the land and all individuals of all races who physically, mentally and morally and spiritually are undesirable and who constitute a menace to our civilization."

Mr. Davis declared that part of the present immigration problem arises through the so-called "boot-legging" of aliens and said that according to some estimates the number smuggled into the U. S. exceeds the number legally admitted.

Advocating "selective immigration," Mr. Davis said that the solicitor of the labor department is now inquiring into the possibility of moving our whole existing machinery to foreign countries.

He declared that nothing would strengthen the immigration policy so much as this move.

He also urged adoption of a system of enrollment of aliens admitted so that the federal government should keep watch over the activities of those of radical tendencies. He further suggested amendment of the LaFollette Senate act, which he said, was furnishing the means for the admission of many undesirable aliens.

Washington, April 18.—Instead of liberalizing the present immigration laws Congress, when it meets should strengthen them, Senator Hiram Bland, Alabama, declared in a statement issued today.

"The sooner genuine American sentiment crystallizes to a point where a vast majority of the people of the United States are united and determined to enforce the doctrine of restricted immigration, the better it will be for our country," the senator said, adding that there was an insidious propaganda "in favor of more liberal immigration laws. Steamship operators," the senator charged, "want the law changed so as to enable them to 'resume their lucrative trade and make America again the dumping ground for the unfit hordes and criminal refuse of other countries. There are other agencies hid away and quietly working behind the screen to the same end."

Report Shortage of Labor in the South

Atlanta, Ga., April 18.—Serious shortage of labor is indicated for all states except Florida and Alabama according to the semi-weekly crop report today of southeastern states by the United Bureau of Agricultural Economics.

Excessive rains have delayed farm work, the report said, especially of the heavier lands in the upper part of the belt as normal progress has been made in Florida and the southern part of Georgia. Corn will have to be replanted in some sections, due to failure to obtain stands from low temperatures and heavy rains.

Early cotton prospects were reported "good" in Florida, extreme South Georgia and Alabama.

Increased acreage in peanuts was indicated in Florida and in North Georgia.

Watermelons and cantaloupes were said to be growing well in the southern part of the belt. Gardens in the Piedmont section and Tennessee were reported as "badly delayed."

Peach prospects were said to be improved in the southern sections and the citrus movement is now decreasing in volume.

Young clover in Tennessee was said to have suffered severely from frosts and heavy rains.

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

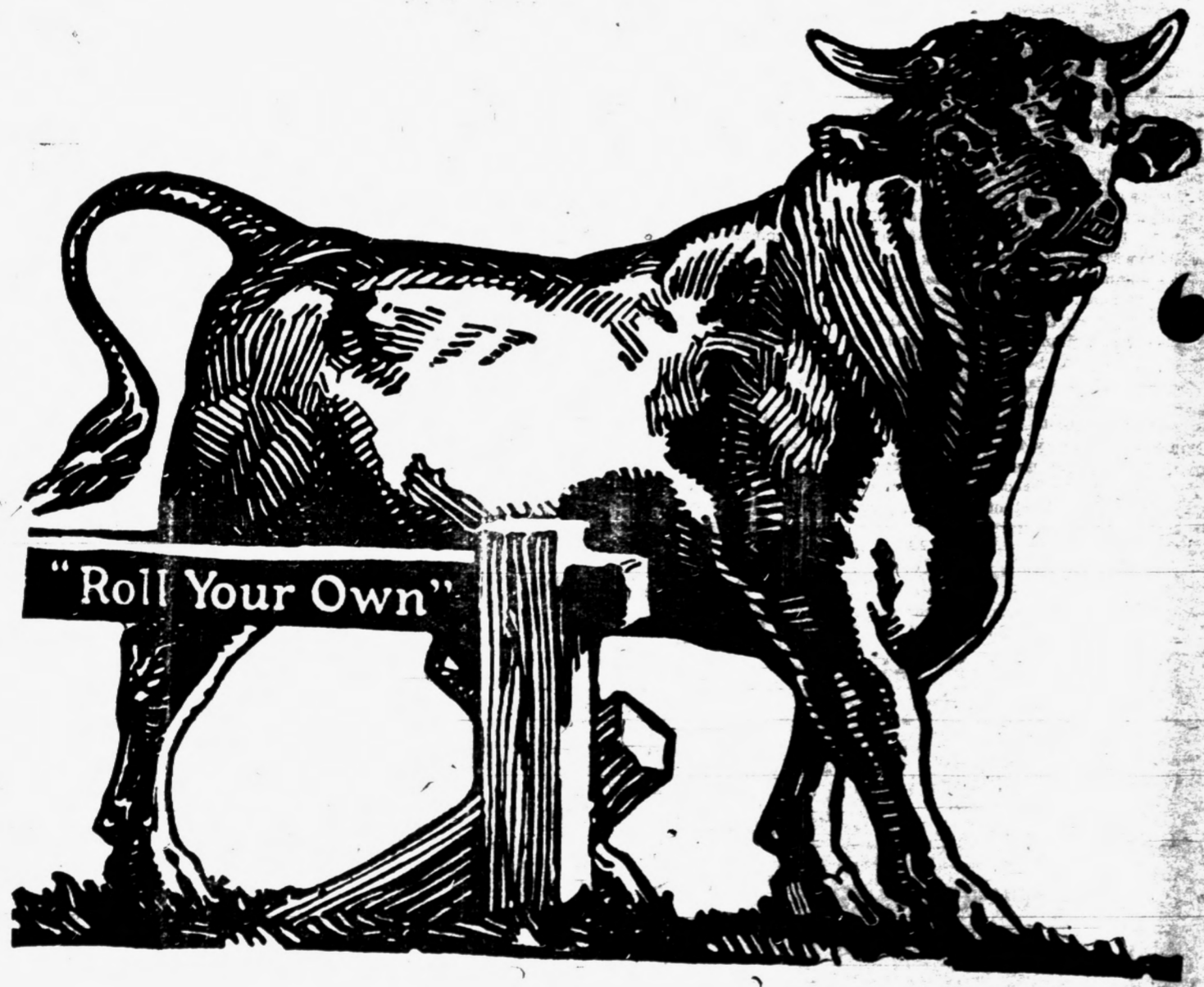



THE ELECT GAMBLERS—OF KENTUCKY.
The claim of its defenders that the Jockey Club brings several millions of dollars into the state is decidedly a weak argument. It is true, the races do draw crowds from all over Kentucky and from other states, and merchants, hotels and restaurants and other places of public entertainment of the cities where the races are held, have thereby an added and much-inflated trade.

But what does that prove? It certainly does not validate gambling by the Jockey Club—nor exonerate the state from taking a rake-off from the loot gathered in by such practices.

It is loot, pure and simple. A group of men, private individuals, are licensed to make races, not for the sport, however "kingly" it may be, but for the money to be gotten out of it to the benefit of a few race-horse and jockey-club exploiters.

Private wealth if gotten rightly contributes to the development and wealth of the state. But the private wealth of these gentlemen, the Jockey Club, is, we understand, being used to bribe legislation and other men in high places. And the \$400,000 annual revenue which the state gets from it, it seems to us, is the ugliest bribery in the whole thing.

It is a discouraging outlook, to assume that this proud old Commonwealth is under the necessity of consorting with gambling interests for the support of the government and public institutions.

And besides, and certainly when any privately-owned concern gets rich enough to corrupt the state and the law makers—then the state is better off without that concern.

A DISTINGUISHED VISITOR.
Mayfield is honored today by having within her precincts Rev. Sam Small, D. D., a nationally known and beloved evangelist and orator, of Roslyn, Va. Dr. Small was born in Knoxville, Tenn., but was reared and educated in Virginia, and is a typical Virginia gentleman of the old school. He is a soldier of the old Confederacy, with the army of which he fought when only fourteen years of age. He has been attending the Reunion at New Orleans, and is returning by easy stages to his home, speaking at various points along the way. He spoke at Memphis Sunday,

and thence to Jackson, Humboldt, Brownsville, and so to Mayfield.

He comes to bring us a message of good will, as one who finished most of the course in life's race. He will speak at the First Methodist church tonight, on "Scrapping the Commandments," a theme, just now peculiarly applicable and important as touching the tendencies of the young people of America.

So renowned a gentleman and servant of the Gospel should have a conspicuous and delighted hearing in Mayfield; and we trust he will carry away with him the remembrance of one of the largest and most appreciative audiences, in his wide experience as a speaker.

BEAUTIFUL HANDS.

Albert Gihon, the French artist and painter, says indulgence in masculine sport makes girls' big-handed. He cautions specially the American girl against the out-door sports, so prevalently practiced by them at this time, as calculated to destroy the form and beauty of their noted shapely hands.

They have been accustomed from childhood, whether rich or poor, of doing household duties, and aiding in the domestic service of their own homes. Of late years, since the Civil war period, they have been leaders in the outside industrial and clerical world—spinning, weaving, cutting, sewing, making millinery and fashioning fine and coarse garments, and doing desk work for commerce and the professions.

But such labor is not conducive to enlarging and distorting the hands. It rather softens them and makes them more shapely and agile. On the other hand, swinging the implements of out-door sports and of the athletic room, running, jumping, tumbling, is a very different thing. If indulged in for any length of time, it not only coarsens the hands, but, we notice, it also coarsens the woman, leaving her instincts of refinement and culture blunted and demoralized.

God never meant the sexes to follow the same lines of labor or pastime. An effeminate man is despised by the world. But a manly woman is a human monstrosity.
