## Shooting Hours Are Set For Dove Hunt

Shooting hours for the upcoming dove hunt in Lutz between the Lakes will begin at 1 p.m. Central Daylight Saving Time and will end at legal sunset, TVA announced today.

The dove hunt, scheduled to be held this year on September 2, 4, 7, 9 and September 12 through October 14, traditionally begins at noon; however, due to Daylight Saving Time the starting time will be 1 p.m.

This year's hunt is to be held on open fields located between Lee Cemetery, Brandon Chapel Roads and Highway 58 on the north, and Turkey Creek, Long Creek Roads and Highway 68 on the south except in the Conservation Education Center and in waterfowl areas in Dunham and Smith Camps, and Croakers and Crooked Creek bottoms when they are posted as closed to hunting.

The tag limit will be 12 doves per hunter per day, and the method of hunting will be according to Federal and state regulations.

## Michael H. Gross Wins The Bronze Star For Bravery

PFC Michael H. Gross, step grandson of Mrs. Zelma Harrell Brown of 307 North 5th Street, Murray, has been awarded the Bronze Star Medal for "heroism in connection with military operations against a hostile force."

Gross is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Cross of Oneida, Tenn.

The notification from the Army said that PFC Gross was serving as a radio-telephone operator on a seal and search of the Long Village. An Army of the Republic of Vietnam force which was assisting in the seal of the village became subjected to a heavy volume of small arms and automatic weapons fire from a numerically superior Viet Cong force. In the initial barrage, several casualties were sustained, including an American officer who serving as an advisor to the ARVN unit.

The Army said that Gross immediately volunteered to lead a unit to assist the beleaguered Vietnamese force. With complete disregard for his personal safety, PFC Gross exposed himself to intense hostile fire as he moved about the area, searching for casualties.

Colonel Edward B. Kitchens, Jr., said Gross was directly responsible for saving the lives of several ARVN soldiers and an American advisor.

## Registration At Murray High To Begin On Friday

Registration for Murray High School students will be held on service available to students by means of a group plan. All students who participate in school activities such as athletics, physical education classes, band, cheerleading, debate, or speech, etc., are encouraged to make use of this service. This insurance covers the student going to and from school, during the school day and when he is on a school trip under the supervision of a school sponsor. The cost of this insurance is \$2.00 per student. This insurance may be purchased in homes on Tuesday morning, August 29. The school lunch room will be open for students staying on Wednesday, August 30. Students will be dismissed at 2:30 p.m. on Wednesday. The first full day of school will be on Thursday, August 31, with dismissal time at 3:10 p.m. Football season tickets for Murray High students will be sold at the school on a date to be announced later. These tickets will cost \$3.00 for five home football games. School will be dismissed Labor Day, September 4.

Murray High School students, grades 8-12, will assemble in the auditorium at 8:30 a.m., Monday, August 28 for the opening exercises. This assembly will feature Rev. T. A. Thacker, Minister of the Memorial Baptist Church, as the guest speaker. Brief remarks will be made by Superintendent Fred Schmitt, and Student Council President, Ada Sue Huston. After the opening exercises, the students will go to their homes to receive their schedules and complete registration.

Students will attend school on a half-day schedule for the first two days. However, the afternoon will be set aside for taking class pictures, purchasing textbooks, and paying course fees. The schedule for taking class pictures will be as follows: Monday, August 28, 1:00 p.m. — 7th grade; 2:00 p.m. — 8th grade; Tuesday, August 29, 1:00 p.m. — Juniors; 2:00 p.m. — Sophomores; 3:00 p.m. — Freshmen.

The school does not sell insurance.

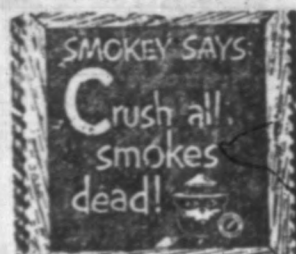
