Mother Makes Suggestions To Judge For The Handling Of Juveniles; Haircut Heads List

The following article appeared in "The Kentucky Press" publication of the Kentucky Press Association and is being reprinted here for the interest of Ledger and Times readers.

Lake Geneva's Municipal Justice John Russell received the unsigned letter which appears below from the mother of a boy arrested in the midst of the Fourth of July rioting in this area.

The letter makes one parent's point and we're indebted to Judge Russell for letting us print it and we're happy to reproduce it here. The letter was postmarked from a near Chicago suburb.

Hon. Judge Russell: I know how busy you are at the moment, and I hope you can take a brief few minutes to read the following letter from a heart broken mother. My son was one of the youths jailed and charged with disorderly conduct, and fined \$100.00. Although he was not in any way involved with the vandalism, I feel he is just as guilty, because he had no business being there. He defied my authority, and went to Lake Geneva.

I am making no excuses for my son. I tried my darndest... but I had to do the job alone... and I guess... the job was too big for me. You see Judge, he is like at least 75% of the boys that were jailed... he is a boy without a father, or a boy without a mother, or a boy without any parents.

Dad Gives Viet Vet Sound Advice

DEAR ABBY: I am scheduled to leave Viet Nam in 3 weeks, after 18 months duty. I wrote my girl and asked her to meet me in Hawaii for the week-end, and we come home together. (We plan to marry soon after I get home.)

When I wrote my parents about Sue's meeting me, here's the letter I got from my father:

Sour cream performs beautifully every time. It is, however, super sensitive to high heat, so never boil a sour cream specialty or it will curdle. Gentle heat for the shortest time possible is the rule for sour cream cookery.

QUICK VICHYSOISE
2 cubes chicken bouillon
1/2 c. boiling water
2 (10-1/2 oz.) cans frozen cream of potato soup
2 c. milk
1/4 c. chopped chives
1 c. dairy sour cream

Dissolve bouillon cubes in water. Combine bouillon, soup, milk and chives in a saucepan. Heat slowly, stirring constantly, until soup is thawed.

Remove from heat, beat with rotary beater or in blender until smooth. Beat in sour cream.

Refrigerate until well chilled, about 4 hours. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

SAVORY BEEF CASSEROLE
1/2 c. butter or margarine
4 lbs. chuck beef, cut in 1-in. cubes
3 c. chopped onion
1 c. chopped celery
1 c. chopped green pepper
2 cloves garlic, minced
2 c. dairy sour cream
2 (8-oz.) cans tomato sauce with cheese
2 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper
1 tsp. basil
1/2 tsp. tarragon
1/2 c. all purpose flour
2 (8-oz.) cans sliced broiled mushrooms with liquid

Melt butter in large aluminum skillet. Trim off excess fat from meat. Add meat and brown well over medium heat.

Add onion, celery, green pepper and garlic, cook until onion is transparent.

Mix together sour cream and remaining ingredients.

Put beef mixture in 5-qt. casserole or in 8x12-in. baking pan. Cover with sour cream mixture. Bake at 325 F. for 2-1/2 hours or until meat is tender.

Serve over cooked green noodles. Makes 10 to 12 servings.

MOCK CHEESECAKE
1 1/2 c. graham cracker crumbs (about 16 crackers)
2 tsp. sugar

Pour into crumb-lined pan; sprinkle with reserved crumbs. Freeze over night. If desired, garnish with fruit.

Hang mirrors flat against a wall to avoid distorted reflections. Place them so that the light falls on the person or object to be reflected, rather than on the mirror itself.

Greenish discolorations in hard-cooked or scrambled eggs occur when the iron in the yolk and white combine to form iron-sulfide. The defect is not harmful. But to avoid, cook eggs at moderate temperatures. Hard-cooked eggs should be simmered starting with cold water. Stirring scrambled eggs frequently to distribute heat helps eliminate the discolor.
