Eastern In Grantland Rice Bowl

MURFREESBORO, Tenn. (AP) - Ohio Valley Conference Eastern Kentucky and Indiana College Conference winner Ball State square off Saturday in the NCAA-sponsored Grantland Rice Bowl in Murfreesboro.

A near sellout of 10,000 is expected at Middle Tennessee State University's Jones Field for a post-season clash for supremacy in the NCAA's College Division Mid-East regional match-up.

Both Ball State 7-3 and Eastern 7-1-3 boast squads filled with All-Conference selections. Nine Ball State were named to the All-ICC unit, including six on the powerful offensive team, while Eastern had a total of six, with three on each unit.

The Ball State Cardinals boast the ICC's most outstanding back in junior halfback Amos Vangoli, who has led the league in rushing and scoring for two successive years. Vangoli's 894 yards rushing and 19 touchdowns on the ground are both school records.

Eastern's other all-OVC choices are guard Fred Trolke, tackle Bill Brewer, linebacker Ron Reed and middle guard Ted Taylor.
