BURLEY ZOOMS TO NEW HIGH IN KENTUCKY

LOUISVILLE_The price of burley tobacco sold in Kentucky has zoomed to a new seasonal high.

The Kentucky Department of Agriculture reports that 11,773,304 pounds sold yesterday for \$5.840,271, an average of \$49.459 per hundred pounds. That average is 14 cents higher than last Monday's opening day price, and \$2.62 higher than last Friday's average.

Effective yesterday, the sales nours were reduced from five to three hours daily. The shorter selling period probably helped prices and will also help redrying plants overcome the backlog of tobacco waiting to be processed for storage In addition, it will permit buyers to purchase tobacco in more or derly fashion
